Footprint is a far-reaching documentation using captivating landscape photographs to emphasize the vulnerability of Europe's population and landscape in the wake of ominous climate change. From the arctic north of Russia to the arid coast of southern Spain, from the glaciers of Spitsbergen to the baked concrete of Athens, the extremes of the European landscape are captured with an eye for both natural and unnatural processes.

Subsequently over the next five years, he made a further twenty visits which the focus shifted from an investigation into the effects of EU membership into a more subjective, poetic, and autobiographical response to a country he grew to love.

Magnum Mentorship Singapore is a mentorship programme conceptualised by SIPF together with Magnum Photos. It is the first collaboration between the esteemed photo cooperative and SIPF, and will be conducted by Magnum photographers Stuart Franklin, Mark Power and recent Magnum Member, Jacob Aue Sobol. The programme is designed to guide and spur participating photographers in refining their portfolio or creating a new body of work, and it will take the form of an intensive programme from July to October 2012, in a combination of an online mentorship and a 5-day in-person workshop.

The programme aims to elevate the standard of Southeast Asian professional photography, as well as to broaden the perspective of professional photographers beyond this region. It also hopes to propel the professional development in Southeast Asian photography through greater dialogue between the photographers and their mentors.

The History of Monuments by Wang Qingsong

<u>SMU Concourse</u> 5 October – 17 November Free admission Spanning 42 metres in length, The History of Monuments is a stunning interpretation of the history of mankind in a photo epic. Mobilising over 200 hundreds models, the renowned Chinese contemporary photographer Wang Qingsong built studio with life size props over weeks to execute this laborious photography work. Well known for his compelling works that convey an ironic vision of 21st-century China's encounter with global consumer culture, The History of Monuments is a highlight not to miss.

Born in 1964, Wang Qingsong grew up in the Daqing oilfields in Heilongjiang Province in northeastern China, where his parents were employed. From a young age he set his sights on becoming an artist, although the path that he followed was hardly an easy one. Determined to make his way as an independent artist, he arrived in Beijing in 1993, just as Chinese contemporary art was beginning to attract international attention.

Wang Qingsong first won recognition as a painter in the mid-1990s through his membership in the Gaudy Art group, a movement influenced by the work of Jeff Koons and championed by China's most influential art critic, Li Xianting. In 1997 he abandoned painting and took up photography, a medium that enabled him to quickly register and comment upon the economic and social changes that were sweeping China. His work has now appeared in more than 20 solo exhibitions and over 80 group exhibitions. He has exhibited internationally at such venues as the Sydney Biennale, the Gwangju Biennale, the Havana Biennial, the Getty Museum, the Hammer Museum, the Mori Art Museum, the National Gallery of Canada, ZKM Karlsruhe, the Moscow House of Photography, and MoMA P.S.1 Contemporary Art Centre. His work was prominently featured in the 2004 ICP exhibition Between Past and Future: New Photography and Video from China.

Hailing from Lyon in France, Alain Jullien holds a Master of Fine Arts in Photographic Print-making from the Parson School of Design, New York. As a photojournalist, Alain has also contributed numerous articles and photographic stories for major magazines such as Life, Newsweek, Fortune, and Time Magazine. His other accolades include Cofounder and Artistic director of the Pingyao International Photography Festival in China; Curator of the Chinese photography exhibition at the Arles Photography Festival in France; Co-founder, Artistic director, and curator of the Guangzhou Photo Biennial, Guangdong Museum of Art in China; as well as Curator and Vice director of the Lianzhou International Photo Festival in China. He was also the invited artistic director for Dali International Photography Exhibition in 2011. Alain Jullien is keen to review documentary and conceptual photography works.

CONTEMPORARY LANDSCAPE PHOTOGRAPHY Andrea Botto (Italy)

Known for his contemporary landscape photography works, Andrea Botto will lead a small class to develop a photographic project starting with classroom review, exploring ideas to the actual field trip shot. Each participant is expected to attend the classroom lecture, and independently carry out a photography shoot and return with selection for further review each day.

Learning Points

- Working with view camera 4 \times 5 inches
- Learn and develop a methodological
- approach to subject.
 Raise your project capacity and thinking to create a coherent body of work, not only single pictures.
- Explore the relationship between the landscape and its photographic representation, alternating sessions of shooting and theoretical-historical analysis.

Suitable for young professionals or serious amateurs working in the field of contemporary landscape photography and fine art, especially in urban areas.

Andrea Botto was born in 1973, in

Rapallo (Genoa, Italy), where he lives and works. Interested in the cross-pollination of various contemporary art mediums, he uses photography as a means of dissecting the world in order to expose its stratifications. Since 1999 his work has been exhibited internationally and awarded the FotoBookFestival Dummy Awards 2012 in Paris, the NotodoFotoFest Award 2007 in Madrid and the European Architectural Photography Prize 2005 in Stuttgart. He teaches the course of Architectural and Industrial Photography at the Istituto Europeo di Design in Turin and he is artistic director of the Rapallo Contemporary Photography Show. His photographs are to be found in private and public collections, as the Galleria Civica in Modena, the Bibliotheque Nationale de France in Paris, the Museo d'Arte Contemporanea di Villa Croce in Genoa, the MAXXI Museum in Rome.



A PHOTO BOOK PROJECT Kai-Olaf Hesse (Germany)

This workshop addresses the prerequisites for the content and design of an image series, which shall then be brought together to construct a photo book. On the basis of participant's own works and books, the workshop will discuss possibilities and critical aspects in regard to the presentation of photographs in book form.

Recommended for professional photographers, students of photography and art, artists using photography, interested amateurs and other interested parties with knowledge of photographic practice. Applicants should bring photographic work with which they want to make a book, or already finished photo books they want to discuss in the workshop.

Learning Points

- Developing of a critical creative practice.
- Developing an understanding of the professional practice of book production.

Each participant will contribute a body of work or previously finished book(s). These will be critically discussed in regard to their transformation into book form. Introduction to the basic outlines of book design and production. Critical support and input to each participant's bookmaking process.

Introduction and discussion of content-, technique-, practice-, and theory related aspects of book making which will support the successful production of a book project in practice. Current developments and positions within the contemporary photo book market will be introduced and viewed in regard of their historic context.

The theory-content of one's own photographic practice will be discussed in light of this, constituting a conceptual cornerstone for a photo book. General aspects of re-presentation of images in a book in relation to "photographs" versus "book project" will be discussed.

Kai-Olaf Hesse is a photographer and since 1996 also works as a book designer for publishers, museums, artists and other institutions. He has contributed to more than 30 book productions and also worked on several personal photographic projects which were eventually conceived as books.



Talking Point

Taking on a more serious tone, this series of public talks aims at deepening the understanding of photography beyond a mere mechanical reproduction by a common gadget, but as a medium that influence the way we perceive the world, and essentially a part of our lives.

BERNH & HILLA BECHER

Directed by Marianne Kapfer (2011). In German with English subtitles. 94 mins. <u>8Q SAM</u> 6 October, 5:00pm & 20 October, 3:00pm

The German photographers Bernd and Hilla Becher are among the most influential artists of our time. For more than forty years they have been recording water towers, coal mines, gas containers or framework houses – the heritage of an industrial past. As the founders of what has come to be known as the 'Becher school' they have brought their influence to generations of documentary photographers and artists. The Bechers give us an insight into their life and work: their approach, their motivation and their fascination with industrial buildings. Their son Max Becher, the students Thomas Struth, Thomas Ruff, Candida Höfer and others complete this unique feature length artist's portrait.

DAIDO MORIYAMA: STRAY DOGS OF TOKYO

Directed by Kenjiro Fujii (2001). In Japanese with English subtitles. 84 mins. <u>The Substation</u> 11 October, 7:00pm

Daido Moriyama: Stray Dog of Tokyo follows the charismatic photographer Daido Moriyama with a single camcorder as he wanders the streets of Shinjuku with his camera in hand as he takes quick snapshots without looking in the finder. The film even captures the moment when he takes his first digital photo. His stark and high contrast black and white images symbolize his fervent lifestyle.

ERWIN OLAF: ON BEAUTY AND FALL

Directed by Michiel van Erp (2009). In Dutch with English subtitles. 50 mins. <u>8Q SAM</u> 13 October, 3:00pm & 21 October, 3:00pm

Dutch photographer Erwin Olaf (1959) is on the threshold of an important year: his most recent photographic series, Hope, Grief and Rain appear to have given him an international breakthrough. His work has been criticised since the 1980s as being produced merely for its shock value, thus eliminating it as art. But now that important art dealers and museums all over the world are showing his works, and huge crowds are visiting his expositions, it seems as if his years of hard work will finally lead to serious recognition. Yet this is occurring, of all times, in a period of his life in which Erwin Olaf is contending with emphysema, a debilitating disease that obliges him to deal cautiously with his energy reserves. Whether his body can keep up with his work pace is uncertain.

In Erwin Olaf: On Beauty and Fall, director Michiel van Erp provides a vulnerable portrait of the most highly visible Dutch artist working abroad. How can you get your work hung in the right museum? By whom do you let yourself be influenced in your choice of subject matter? Van Erp follows Erwin Olaf at important openings and expositions, and filmed the photographer during intensive fotoshoots.



KESSELS' EYE

Directed by Simone de Vries (2009). In English. 55 mins. <u>8Q SAM</u> 13 October, 4:30pm & 21 October, 4:30pm

Erik Kessels is co-founder of the unconventional advertising agency KesselsKramer, graphic designer, curator but moreover he is a passionate photo collector, which he exhibits in books. Kessels is a rebbellious spectator, who won't settle for a simple interpretation. He always sees more. In Kessels' Eye we look through his eyes and see new perspectives in ordinary images. Martin Parr (Magnum Photographer) on Erik Kessels: 'We are surrounded by images that are propaganda – with the main purpose to sell us something. Even a family album is a form of propaganda because people take pictures trying to make the family album look like it's the perfect family. We have to counter the propaganda we are surrounded by.'

How should we determine what is important among the seemingly endless stream of images that bombard us every day? Kessels edits, combines and brings stories to the surface that others may have missed. To Kessels it is essential to keep looking and question what we see. 'Looking is more than just consuming', says Kessels. 'People let images float past, but fail to really see them.'

MAGNUM PHOTOS: THE CHANGES OF A MYTH

Magnum Photos is probably the most famous cooperative in the world. It was founded in New York in 1947 by the photographers Robert Capa, Henri Cartier-Bresson, David Seymour and George Rodger, with the aim of ensuring that photographers retained copyrights for their own work, thereby enabling them to work independently. Very soon after its founding, the agency represented the best photojournalists in the world.

For the next 50 years, the world of photojournalism underwent a serious change. Photographic reports have largely been replaced by television reporting. Reiner Holzemer looks back at how the cooperative was founded and also examines how its members are dealing with the changed market conditions. For the first time ever, the makers of this film succeeded in shooting a whole Magnum Meeting, at which decisions are made for the future of this legendary agency. Knowing that some of the protagonists are not among us anymore makes this film a precious memory.

PICTURES FROM A REVOLUTION

Directed by Susan Meiselas (1991). In English. 92 mins. <u>The Substation</u> 14 October, 3:00pm <u>8Q SAM</u> 27 October, 3:00pm

No one captured more powerfully the suffering, sacrifice, and finally celebration that accompanied the Sandinista victory than photographer Susan Meiselas. A decade later, Meiselas, together with her co-directors Richard P. Rogers and Alfred Guzzetti, returns to Nicaragua and attempts to track down the people – guerrillas, Somocistas, bystanders – found in her photographs. The result is a provocative study of the Nicaraguan revolution and its aftermath as well as a frank inquiry into the contradictions inherent in recording history.

IMAGE MAKERS: SINGAPOREAN PHOTOGRAPHERS

Directed by Chow Chee Yong, Tay Kay Chin & John Clang (2012). In English. 9 mins/15 mins/15 mins. <u>The Substation</u> (followed by Q&A session with Tay Kay Chin and Chow Chee Yong)

Shooting Home Masters: Chow Chee Yong, John Clang and Tay Kay Chin. They are all internationally renowned photographers from Singapore, and they all have a huge influence on the photography scene beyond their work. In mini documentaries, we attempt to get to the heart of their work, what motivates them and how they approach creating work. These documentaries made by Singaporean film makers, attempt to get to the artists behind iconic Singaporean images and reveal clues for future generations of photographers. As art is unique to the individual, it cannot be taught, but the paths of masters can yield important clues to the process of creating work, and inspire others to find their own path, the path to Shooting Home. Shooting Home is an annual photography mentorship programme, run by Objectifs, targeted at the most talented emerging photographers based in Singapore. Participants are encouraged to draw inspiration from their existing environment and ultimately contribute to 'home' and the arts scene. Chow Chee Yong, John Clang and Tay Kay Chin are role models for young photographers in Singapore, they are the photographers that have contributed much to the Singaporean photography scene.



JR: WOMEN ARE HEROES

Directed by Emile Abinal & JR (2010). In various language with English subtitles. 85 mins. National Museum of Singapore 16 November, 7:00pm Alliance Française 19 November, 7:30pm

Women Are Heroes is the first movie of the French young photographer JR who lives in Paris and has become a hero to many people around the world. He doesn't use his real name, because most of the work he does is illegal. This documentary film takes place around the world and particularly in Brazil, India, Kenya and Cambodia. It begins in the favelas of Brazil, where we recognize the huge posters of JR and the reactions they provoke in women. Then in India, where we discover women caught between traditional customs and modern day. Then Kenya, where, again, women must live in a more chaotic and unstable environment. Finally, in Cambodia, we will face the violence of the ultra violent expropriation against households headed by a matriarchal system that attempts to resist the face of real estate giants. Each woman in the film amazes us with her courage and faith. It took three years for JR to make this movie. An Official Selection in Festival de Cannes 2010.

Duration: 4 hours

Students learn about the history of the pinhole camera, principles of pinhole photography and how to build their own camera obscura in this fun-filled hands-on workshop. For most of the young generation who have grown up surrounded by digital technology and gadgets, seeing how photographic images develop in a traditional darkroom would be no doubt a magical experience for all.



RETELLING HISTORIES: AN OLD PHOTO PROJECT

Duration: 3.5 hours

History is a composition of memories. In this activity, students bring along an old photo from their school or family albums and will be guided in writing a short story behind each photograph. The aim, besides creative writing, is also to lead students into contextualizing their personal accounts in the larger fabric of national or social history. Plus, students will also get to learn how to shoot self portraits to express their identity and personality in a creative way, and take home their printed photographs.
